Indicator 7: Early Childhood Outcomes Data for 2016-2017

2016-2017 Hearing Impaired – 35 children exited Early Childhood Programs

- Outcome 1: Social emotional skills
 - 97% made progress
 - 51% functioning at age expectations or slightly below
- Outcome 2: Acquisition and use of knowledge and skills (e.g., problem solving, reasoning, thinking, literacy, numeracy, , spatial relations)
 - 100% made progress
 - 48% functioning at age expectations or slightly below
- Outcome 3: Behavior to meet needs (e.g., communication, navigation, self-help)
 - 100% made progress
 - 60% functioning at age expectations or slightly below

Educational Programs & Services

Least Restrictive Environment

 The Virginia State Performance Plan (SPP) target is to increase the percentage of children with IEPs, ages 6-21, spending at least 80 percent of their day in general education classrooms to 68 percent.

Least Restrictive Environment

 The Virginia SPP target is for 38% of preschool children with IEPs, ages 3-5, to attend and receive the majority of their special education and related services within a regular early childhood program.

Virginia School for the Deaf and the Blind

- Located in Staunton, VA
- State Agency governed by VSDB Board of Visitors; Pat Trice,
 Superintendent
- Provides comprehensive educational and life skills programs and related services for approximately 90-100 students (K-12) with IEPs who are Deaf/ Hard of Hearing, Blind/Visually Impaired, Deaf-Blind and Multi-disabled
- Students and staff utilize varied communication modalities
- Students attend day program (Monday-Friday) or residential program (Sunday-Friday)

VSDB

- Number of students with additional disabilities is increasing
- Students are referred for admission through the local educational authority (LEA) IEP process and early intervention IFSP programs
- No direct costs to the LEA or families for students to attend
- VSDB Outreach Programs assist early intervention providers, school divisions, and families statewide through training, live events, webinars, and consultative services

Technical Assistance Center for Deaf & Hard of Hearing & VNOC

- Virginia Network of Consultants (VNOC) VCU
 - Provides consultant services directly to Virginia school divisions for instructional strategies, all communication modalities, amplification, cochlear implants, assistive technology, and assessment/evaluation
 - Service requests are initiated by schools/school divisions
 - Most costs for VNOC services are reimbursed to schools/school divisions
- Opening Doors-Unlocking Potential-Virginia's annual professional development event for Virginia educational professionals who work with children who are Deaf & Hard of Hearing in Virginia schools
- Opening Doors to Life Beyond High School-Virginia's transition focused event for students, professionals and parents of students who are Deaf & Hard of Hearing

Radford University Deaf/Hard of Hearing Teacher Preparation Program

- Offers VA's only state and nationally accredited comprehensive undergraduate and graduate programs for teacher candidates seeking the VA teacher licensure endorsement in *Hearing Impairments PreK-12*
- Assists with alleviating the critical state and national shortages of teachers in the field of Deafness/Hard of Hearing
- VDOE grant funding supports personnel, tuition assistance, stipends, and student scholarships

Educational Interpreter Training

- In 2016, 247 of the 330 (75%) educational interpreters working in VA schools met the Virginia interpreter qualifications
- VDOE grant funding supports free professional development and training activities coordinated by regional Educational Interpreter Professional Development Grant Coordinators
- Regional and statewide training events, college courses and mentoring activities are offered for educational interpreters and cued language transliterators working in VA schools
- Assists with alleviating critical shortages of qualified educational interpreters in VA

Virginia Project for Children & Young Adults With Deaf-Blindness

Virginia's "Deaf-Blind Project" - VCU

- Provides direct support to families, teachers, and service providers to improve outcomes for children with varying degrees and types of combined hearing and vision loss
- VDOE grant funding supports free intensive online training and on-site coaching for participating classroom teacher/para professional teams
- Conducts the annual US Office of Special Education Programs
 Deaf-Blind census (birth-22); 190 children/youth in VA were
 reported in 2015

Virginia Department for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing

- Provides information about resources for persons who are Deaf and Hard of Hearing, their families, and the professionals who serve them, including:
 - training on DHH topics
 - assistive technology
 - interpreter services
 - computer assisted real-time transcription services (C.A.R.T.)
 - interpreter skills assessments
- VDOE grant funding supports the costs for developing and administering the Virginia Quality Assurance Screening assessments, and administering the Educational Interpreter Performance Assessments for VA's educational interpreters

Virginia Hearing Aid Loan Bank

- VDOE grant funding assists with costs for providing free loaner hearing aids and FM systems for children with hearing loss
- Devices are typically loaned for up to six months while families/schools are waiting for a permanent device




